**GENERAL**

1. Call to Order, Welcome & Pledge of Allegiance

Chair Robert Bassett

Robert Bassett was elected Chair, and Frank DeFrancesco was elected Vice-Chair for the 2022-2024 LEPC.

Tampa Fire Rescue Chief Robert Collins and Petty Officer Brian Hanson of the USCG Incident Management Division provided an overview of the Hazmat Incident of a jet fuel tanker that overturned on Gandy Blvd. in Tampa in February 2022.

### RECAP OF SERC MEETINGS July 14-15, 2022 Naples, FL

#### Training Task Force- July 14, 2022 – 9:30 a.m.

**Project Boxes** (Active, Completed, Tabled, or Monitored)

TTF discussed the status of projects, which included:

- Shipboard HAZMAT Response- ACTIVE
- Mass Technical Decon Team Capabilities Assessments- REMOVED. The HAZMAT team decon questions will be determined in subsequent TTF conference calls and added to the HAZMAT team Capabilities Assessment project. The questions for decon

capabilities will be on the next TTF conference call.

- HAZWOPER VS HAZMAT Technician question: COMPLETED. In Florida, public safety emergency response requires 160 hr HAZMAT Technician; if not an emergency but a contracted spill cleanup, the responsible party can/might require the HAZWOPER instead. (In the BP oil spill, HAZMAT teams (trained to 160 hr technician) were not being reimbursed for 911 calls for tar balls because BP required HAZWOPER (40 hr) for cleanup personnel;
- HAZMAT Awareness and Operations Capabilities Checklists- COMPLETED
- HAZMAT Team Marketing- REMOVED (This was to increase awareness in the community of the capabilities of their HM Teams).
- Chemistry in schools programs- REMOVED (this came out of a 2009 conference)
- SME database- ACTIVE-Develop a list of Subject Matter Experts that can deploy to the field or state EOC. These will need to be trained under the Fire Chief's SERP plan.

### **Offshore Hazmat Pilot Program Update**

The 2-day pilot program was conducted with six students. They advised that offshore response is intended to be a small recon team (2-4 Florida HAZMAT techs), as opposed to a whole group, sent offshore to assess the hazard, identify the materials, and advise the USCG of how bad is wrong, to support decision-makers, and to mitigate for life safety, if able. In the meantime, vessels will institute their response plans and contracts, engage SMEs, and USCG will be enroute (12 hrs ETA with two people arriving sooner).

The pilot program was intended to help participants think about what they would need to bring because there is no going back and forth to the truck; how it would be brought onto the ship, which they would contact aboard and ship nomenclature.

Lessons learned:

- Use a commercial vessel in training, not a tug boat (big difference in climbing a 10' or 30.' ladder)
- Needed water confidence training (ahead of time); can fall from 30' into the water in gear and it takes 3-5 minutes for the boat to come and pull them out.
- Needed to train in offshore waters for wind and wave variables (seasickness will affect some)
- Training needs to be longer duration (only did two scenarios: one static and one underway)
- Scenarios need to be written by a tech with readings, etc
- A lot of HAZMAT gear is heavy and not designed for hoisting up a ship
- Teams needed roping
- In one scenario, the team would have used PAPRs on land; but if they fall in the water, it is rendered useless, and is 3-5 minutes in the water until boat pickup, so not a good idea. (Requires supplied air)
- PPE- Requires Hard versus inflatable life vests (i.e., no hydrostatic or dynamic vests), as these move and might break the mask seal and move other PPE equipment.
- They need to focus more on logistics to give them the professional training environment they deserve.

## **SERC Guidelines**

The LEPCs Training and Needs Assessment project prompted FDEM to bring up the SERCs Training Guidelines at the meeting. These were published in 2017 (based on the 2015 NFPA standards). The plan is to put the document on a five-year update schedule and to develop a crosswalk to the NFPA standards so it can be a one-stop shop for all of the standards and provide guidance to each of the disciplines.

SERC can update the document at any time. Rule 69A also references the specific document (currently the 2017 version). Since SERC is requesting 69A be opened and it has been five years since last updated, it's the perfect time to update the document; FDEM may get some quotes for editing it.

## **BUXUS Letter Review**

TTF will be writing a letter on behalf of SERC to TECO to be a part of this program. The SERC will not endorse BUXIS, per se, but will support the concept of encouraging collaboration and cooperation that enables responders to have tools like this and E-plan.

## **Rule 69A-37 FAC Update** (Added as new Project).

The SFM is responsible for citations under the Legislatures revisions to Ch 556, and its requirements to call the 8-1-1 hotline before digging (including homeowners) to avoid damage to utility/pipelines. SFM Arson Investigators will pursue criminal offenses if there is a fatality or Injury with overnight hospital stay; the other level of citation is disruption of 50+ customers which is a civil citation; however, SFM does not have civil citation authority and will need the authority having jurisdiction to issue those and to report these incidents.

Citations help to make the repeat offenders accountable and put the incident in the public record, for subsequent use by those contracting for service, or possible license suspension if an entity has X number of occurrences.

See also "Safe Excavator," an app open to the public.

**SFM will be developing a survey for the LEPCs to conduct** in support of SFMs Ch 556 training and reporting initiative.

Additionally, most jurisdictions have a HAZMAT recovery ordinance in place, no matter how big or minor an incident is if you have that in place, consider using it.

- FDEM and TTF will need to decide whether to put all the documents on the publicly facing website.
- FDEM will seek the lawyer's opinion on whether TTF needs to change document titles from SOPs to SOGs or Model SOPs or some other name to emphasize that it is a guidance, not a legally binding process. An issue is that agency people often use SOP and SOG interchangeably. The term "Best Practice" was discussed but said it might not be the best practice in every jurisdiction.

## **Hazards Analyses Working Group Report**

FDEM sent HA contracts. This group convenes periodically. Emerald Coast LEPC advised in a recent assessment that it attempted to create a VZ lookup but could not without GIS points on chemical storage. GIS points in E-plan are not usually to a chemical location but an entrance.

## **2022 HAZMAT Symposium Update**

Registration fees will be increasing. The next Symposium will be on the 10th anniversary.

## **Offshore HAZMAT Pilot Program Update**

See TTF report; PPE must come from the region's HMEP allocations. Suggested ask PHMSA for any turnback money from other states (December 31) to purchase PPE for the offshore HAZMAT PPE. FDEM will inquire.

## **Operating Trust Fund (OTF) Financial Status update**

Stable now but cannot go back to pre-2020 contracts yet.

## **Rule 69A**

They will be asking SERC to open Rule 69A to change the HAZMAT requirements to allow for state certification for non-fire discipline HAZMAT techs and state and fed partners.

**Battery Shipments-** a newer trend is 18-wheelers packed floor to ceiling carrying batteries for the solar industry, electric vehicles, etc. Due to the quantity onboard and the potential for one battery to impact the others, they have the potential to become HAZMAT incidents in themselves. One of the regions is working with PHMSA to get a Battery Response course approved for using HMEP funds.

### **Hazardous Materials Incidents Report**

The SERC received the HMIS report, which noted the following incidents in the state. There were no incidents over RQ were reported in the EC LEPC region, and three traffic accidents with diesel or fuel releases with injuries.

### **Offshore Hazmat – Rich Lavigne**

See previous reports; The SERC Chair requested they add an element focusing on extracting a person and conducting decon on shore; also consider partnering with the military and obtaining a decommissioned ship for use in training, instead of them sending for scrap.

### **OTF update – Rob Dietrich**

FDEM has been advised that the Legislature is committed to keeping FDEM's hazardous materials efforts solvent, so FDEM is hopeful that the remaining Legislative Budget Request (which was only half funded last year) will be considered again and financed; however, that is not necessarily the same as a commitment to keeping the LEPC or HA contracts at the same level. It is hoped that these can return to normal in future years, but currently, these must stay reduced. Funding from the trust fund resulting from fees in each program continues to drop.

Since 2019, annual funding in the trust fund declined \$101K from \$2,381,634 to \$2,136,712 from EPCRA; and 67,000 to 43,800 (a difference of \$23,200) from fees collected from RMP. This is attributed to successful program implementation and encouragement of safer chemicals, although the number of facilities has increased.

FDEM Update- Over the next 3-5 years, FDEM will be realigning its regions to be consistent with that of the LEPCs. They will also be included in the next LBR a request to fund additional

Regional Coordinator positions. They also hope to use EMPG dollars (which go up as the population rises), public assistance, or mitigation dollars. Regions 3, 6, and 7 have extensive drive times across their region, sometimes 2.5 hours minimum. The SERC (except FDEM personnel) employees made a motion to support FDEM's request.

- Ch 556 notifications (utility/pipeline incidents from digging): Contractors must make notifications to the State Watch Office in an incident. They should not assume the city or county made the notification. The SWO would prefer multiple calls to none.

### **Presentation Chlorine Generator - Michael Mies**

A vendor made a presentation on a chlorine generator that works similar to pool salt water generators that can be used for wastewater treatment facilities or in decon operations; producing bleach that is at less concentration minimizing the need for chlorine or bleach storage and therefore eliminating the chlorine gas or sodium hypochlorite incident releases.

## Fentanyl Training

A recent Gadsden County incident had nine deaths from fentanyl. A motion was made to have the SERC recognize fentanyl as a critical/imminent threat to first responders, hospitals, and the public; and that fentanyl and chemical suicide is an issue under the purview of the SERC as a HAZMAT incident.

A letter will be sent to the Governor by the SERC, and the LBR will include a request for fentanyl training and equipment and all agencies involved need to incorporate it into training. The SERC Chair will be including a request in their LBR for Fentanyl training and equipment for responder protection. A training curriculum has been built by one of the LEPCs. TTF was asked to identify the dollars to be requested. At the next meeting, the TTF Chair was asked to deliver a presentation on How Fentanyl and other Drugs affect responders.

#### 10. Tampa Bay LEPC's HMEP Training Program Update

Battalion Chief Chris Gould

Mr. Ellis issued a report on the current status of the HMEP training courses. It was noted that there was a larger-than-anticipated budget surplus as two courses were no longer scheduled to occur during the HMEP cycle. Alternative training and equipment were identified to replace the scheduled course. Both Hazmat Technicians 160-Hr. courses for Hernando and Pasco County were successfully on track to be completed within Q4.

#### 11. Training, Workshop, and Conference Opportunities

Chair Bassett

Chair Bassett announced that a list of upcoming training for regions four and six were found in the agenda materials. The database of training opportunities was obtained from SERTTRAC from August 2022 to November 2022. Chair Bassett then solicited from the membership if there were any additional upcoming trainings to be discussed.

Mr. Ellis advised of training opportunities that were presented to him by LEPC membership and also from the latest Ammonia Handlers meeting.

Joe Mastandrea was also called upon to discuss his CAMEO , MARPLOT, and ALOHA training.
